- January: The Ten Thousand Doors of January by Alix E. Harrow Historical, Fantasy. Pages: 364. In January Scaller's world, there are Doors that open to other worlds. You just need to know to look for them. Harrow's historical fantasy tackles familial loss and estrangement, as well as class and race relations in the early 20th century.
- **February: The Storied Life of A. J. Fikry** Contemporary, Pages: 288 "Funny, tender, and moving, The Storied Life of A. J. Fikry reminds us all exactly why we read and why we love."
- March: The Maid by Nita Prose Mystery. Pages 304.
   Cozy whodunit introduces a one-of-a-kind heroine who will steal your heart.

- April: When We Were Young & Brave: by Hazel Gaynor Historical, Pages: 448
  China during WWII, inspired by true events surrounding the Japanese Army's internment of teachers and children from a British-run missionary school.
- May: What Alice Forgot By: Liane Moriarty Contemporary, Pages: 488

  "The gripping story of a woman who wakes up with a bump on her head and no knowledge of the past ten years...an acutely observed romantic comedy that is both thought-provoking and funny."
- June: A Death in Door County by Annelise Ryan Contemporary, Mystery, Pages: 336
  A Wisconsin bookstore owner and cryptozoologist is asked to investigate a series of deaths that just might be proof of a fabled lake monster in this first installment of a new mystery series.
- July: Remarkably Bright Creatures by Shelby Van Pelt 368, Humorous Fiction
  For fans of A Man Called Ove, a charming, witty and compulsively readable exploration of friendship, reckoning, and hope that traces a widow's unlikely connection with a giant Pacific octopus.
- August: Lessons in Chemistry by Bonnie Garmus Comedy, historical, romance, 400. pages.
   About a scientist in 1960s California whose career takes a detour when she becomes the unlikely star of a beloved TV cooking show. Meet at the library at 4:30pm to carpool to Stoney Acres Farm in Athens. Cost of pizza will be shared amongst goers. This book club meeting is a Friday. Half the book club will read one for the people on the plane's point of view; the other half the other will read the book from the town's people point of view. Readers can choose one or both books.
- September: The Dutch House by Ann Patchett 352pgs, Family Saga
  A richly moving story that explores the indelible bond between two siblings, the house of their childhood, and a past that will not let them go.
- October: The Cartographers: A Novel by Peng Shepherd. Suspense Thriller/Fantasy, Pages: 400 "Cleverly imagined.... With an elaborately realized plot, fanatic cartographers, maps with surreal powers generated by phantom settlements (intentional errors), and many-faceted suspense, Shepherd contrasts science and art, obsession and love in a bedazzling metaphysical tale of lost and found."
- November: America's First Daughter by Stephanie Dray and Laura Kamoie. Biographical Historical Fic 587 pages
  Richly researched novel that draws from thousands of letters and original sources, this is the untold story of Thomas
  Jefferson's eldest daughter, Martha "Patsy" Jefferson Randolph--a woman who kept the secrets of our most enigmatic
  founding father and shaped an American legacy.
- **December: The Orphan's Tale by Pam Jenoff** Historical, Pages: 368 A powerful novel of friendship set in a traveling circus during World War II.
